This table shows the racial make-up of each county in 2010 (left) and the change in each racial group's share of the population since 2000 (right). While Denver has the highest share of non-white population, its racial make-up changed little in the past decade. The suburban counties, however, all saw Hispanic increases of at least 2 points. Arapahoe County also saw a notable increase in its black population.
